### Candlemas

Hard to believe it has been forty days since we celebrated the Incarnation at Christmas, and yet, here we are. Most Christian households put away all their Christmas decorations at the end of the season, but many will leave out their nativity set. There is a connection between the birth of our Lord and his presentation in the temple. Even though it is not part of the Christmas season, it is the last feast on the liturgical calendar where we celebrate Jesus as an infant.



It is in the reading from Luke's gospel where we meet our friends Simeon and Anna. They are depicted in this icon. Simeon is holding the child Jesus and Anna is between Mary and Joseph. It is the beautiful canticle of Simeon that we pray each night during night prayer. It is called the *Nunc Dimittis*. It means "now you let depart." Read these words again that we heard in the gospel:

Lord, now you let your servant go in peace; your word has been fulfilled: my own eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared in the sight of every people: a light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people Israel.

When we pray at night we give thanks to God for his goodness and for his providential care. However, it is also a time to reflect on how we have accepted God's will; how we accept our own death. If we hold the light of Christ for ourselves and others we indeed have nothing to fear.

Simeon, shares with Mary the first of her seven sorrows. A foreshadowing of the cross. And yet, in the words "a light to reveal you to the nations" we have Easter, the glorious feast of light when at the Easter vigil we celebrate the light of Christ breaking into the darkness and conquering death and sin. Today's feast is a great bridge between Christmas and Easter.




